Priority 1	Small Teacher-Led Maths and English classes in Year 6 for pupils falling behind age-related expectations. £32,903.35
Priority 2	Additional teacher working part-time for one month in Year 2 to fill gaps in phonic knowledge and application. £1,166.66
Barriers to learning these priorities address	Our internal tracking shows that children are most disadvantaged when they face multiple challenges. Research carried out by the Education Endowment Foundation (EEF) confirms this. Many of our disadvantaged children are also on the SEN register and so need a high level of intervention to help close the attainment gap with their peers. The EEF has also found that the most effective way to close the attainment gap is through Quality First
Projected spending	Teaching. £34,069.35

#### Targeted academic support for current academic year

Measure	Activity
Priority 1	Purchase 8 laptops and associated set up costs. This is one for each class in KS2.
Barriers to learning these priorities address	Many of our Pupil Premium children have SEN and several have dyslexic tendencies or are reluctant writers. Provision of the laptops will enable them to fully access the Clicker 7 programme which helps support writing and engagement.
Projected spending	£3,118.00

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#### Review: last year's aims and outcomes

Aim	Outcome
Improved progress for PP children.	At the last assessment point prior to lockdown, the overall attainment of PP children was in line with,or exceeded the average attainment score of all pupils in school.
	This is with the exception of medium prior attainders in writing and higher prior attainers in reading. In these cases, the achievement score of PP children was slightly below the score for all children. This will need to be monitored.
Increase in the emotional wellbeing of the children.	Several of our children faced emotional challenges due to their home circumstances and the effect of lock down. Our ELSA team was actively involved in supporting these children and their families. They also helped support transition back into school. They have worked closely with social workers and their contribution has received very positive comments from the Children's Services team.
Increased attendance rates for pupils eligible for Pupil Premium.	In the 2019 autumn term, prior to lockdown in Spring 2020, the attendance of Pupil Premium children was 96.5%. However, there are some children within this group whose attendance is still of particular concern. The Safeguarding Lead, Kite Family Support worker and Kite Attendance Officer are working closely with the family to encourage and support attendance. During the lockdown of 2020, this team also worked hard to encourage those Pupil Premium children that school considered to be vulnerable to attend school.
